Camp Sunrise Adventures!

Camp Sunrise has seen its fair share of unpredictable weather, from scorching hot temperatures to teeth chattering rains. During these past weeks, youth from Minneapolis and St. Paul battled the unpredictable Minnesota weather with ease and excitement. Although the Camp Sunrise summer was shorter this year, it was still as memorable as ever.

At the start of each week, youth from a variety of backgrounds around the Twin Cities gather together at the YouthCARE office to wait for the bus that will take them all to camp. Once they enter the rainbow-colored gates of Camp Sunrise, they do not know what's in store for them.

As the bus rolls to a stop and the driver shuts the engine off, it suddenly gets invaded by an enthusiastic group of counselors, high-fiving all the occupants and being greeted with gigantic hellos. Once they recover from the unexpected invasion, the campers settle on the log benches around the fire pit, where introductions circulate around the group. Camper exchange nervous stares, only to later transform into looks of disbelief and shock by the discovery of Camp Sunrise's lovely outhouses, as well as to the realization that their cell phones do not have any service. After the campers hear the overview of their week, they all migrate to the lodge for lunch and then separate into one of four families for the week, A Crew, B Crew, C Crew, and D Crew. After settling down in the large army style tents, the crews plan out their week up at Camp Sunrise, from the number of miles they will be canoeing, to what they will be eating, and where they will be going for their Eco-Adventure day.

Typical Week at Camp



Crews have the option of canoeing a leisurely distance of 32 miles down the St. Croix or a strenuous 56-mile stretch. If either option is a bit too easy or intimidating, there are distances in between that campers can choose: 35 miles or 40 miles! While on the river, youth learn how to canoe, build fires, and pitch tents. They are also encouraged to practice minimum impact camping and participate in Adopt-a-River, in which they pick up litter along the way.



When the crews arrive back at camp, they shower, socialize with others crews, and relax for the next day's adventure. Crews will either be on their Eco-Adventure Day excursion or earning valuable community service hours during their Service Day project. For their Eco-Adventure



Day, crews have the option of spending the day at the Fur Trading Post, St. Croix State Park, Interstate Wisconsin and Minnesota, or the No Harm Farm. Depending on the location, youth get the chance to swim, hike, unwind, and learn more about the animals and environment around them. The crews that are not on their Eco Day spend their day at camp completing a service project. Almost every thing at camp has been built or assembled by
